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## 1. Introduction

In alignment with the institutional commitment towards quality enhancement, curriculum innovation, and academic excellence, the **Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), K.R. Mangalam University**, in collaboration with the **AIU–Academic and Administrative Development Centre (AADC)** and the **Association of Indian Universities (AIU)**, successfully organised a **Five Days Online Faculty Development Programme (FDP)** on *“Quality-Driven Curriculum Design, Development and Pedagogical Innovation for Future-Ready Higher Education”* from 30 March to 03 April 2026.

The FDP was conceptualized as a **strategic quality initiative to strengthen faculty competencies in curriculum planning, development, and pedagogical innovation, in alignment with NEP 2020, Outcome-Based Education (OBE), and accreditation quality benchmarks**. The programme addressed the evolving need for higher education institutions to design learner-centric, outcome-driven, and future-ready curricula supported by innovative teaching-learning practices.

Adopting a structured thematic progression, the FDP guided participants through curriculum frameworks, mapping and alignment, pedagogical innovation, assessment strategies, and quality assurance practices. **Faculty members, academic leaders, and researchers from diverse disciplines actively participated, making the programme a collaborative and interdisciplinary academic platform.**

DAY 1 – 30 MARCH 2026

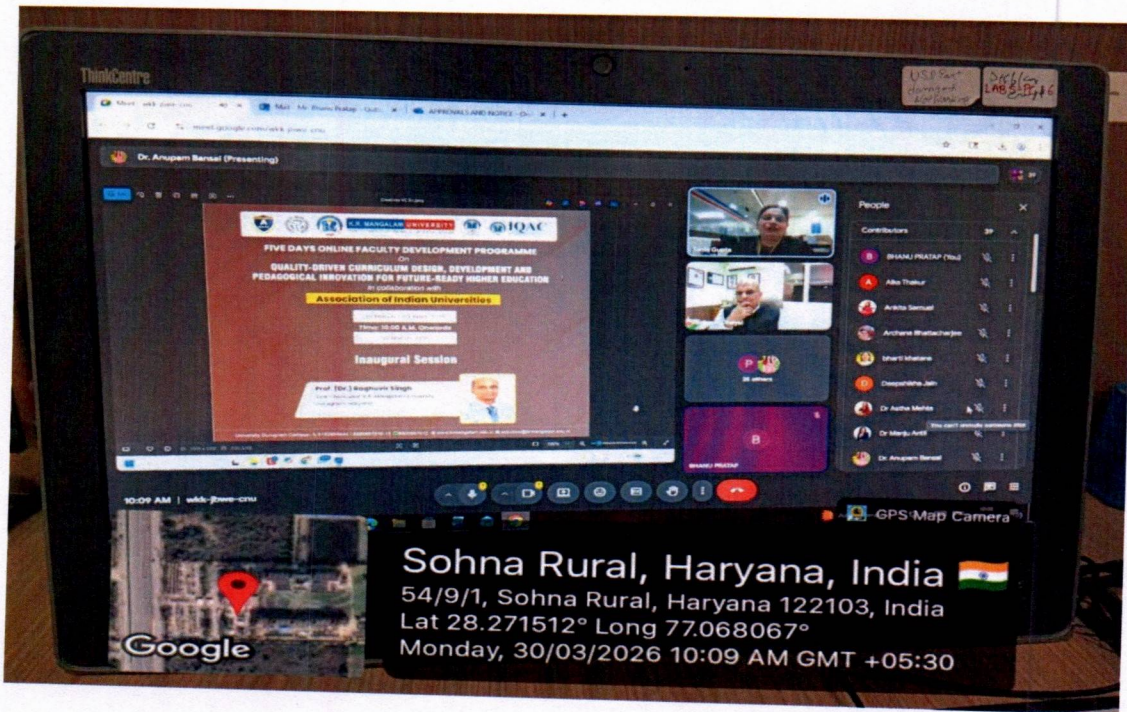

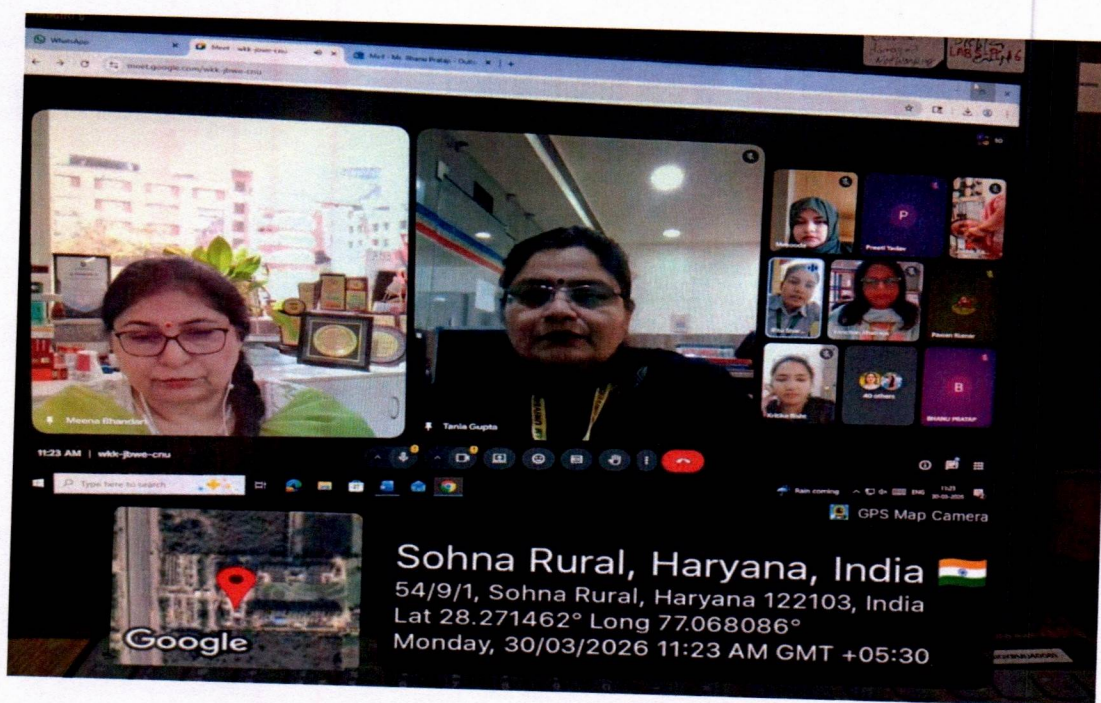


## **Theme: Foundations of Quality Curriculum Design**

## **Session 2: Curriculum Development, Revision & BOS Process**

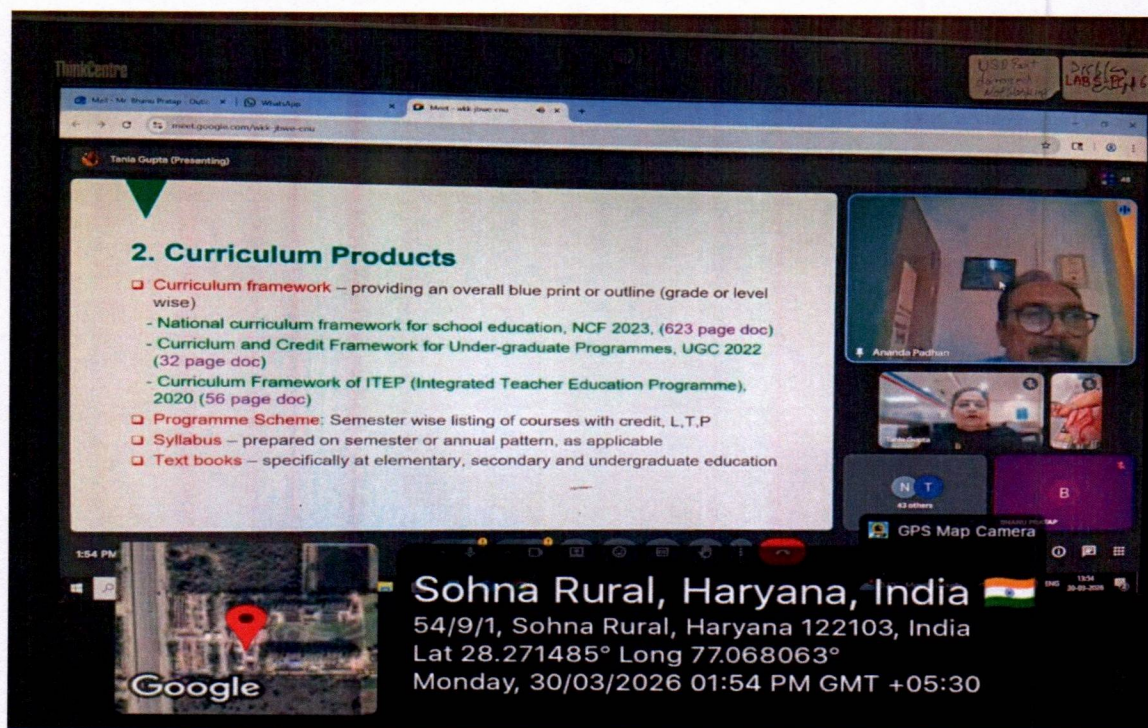

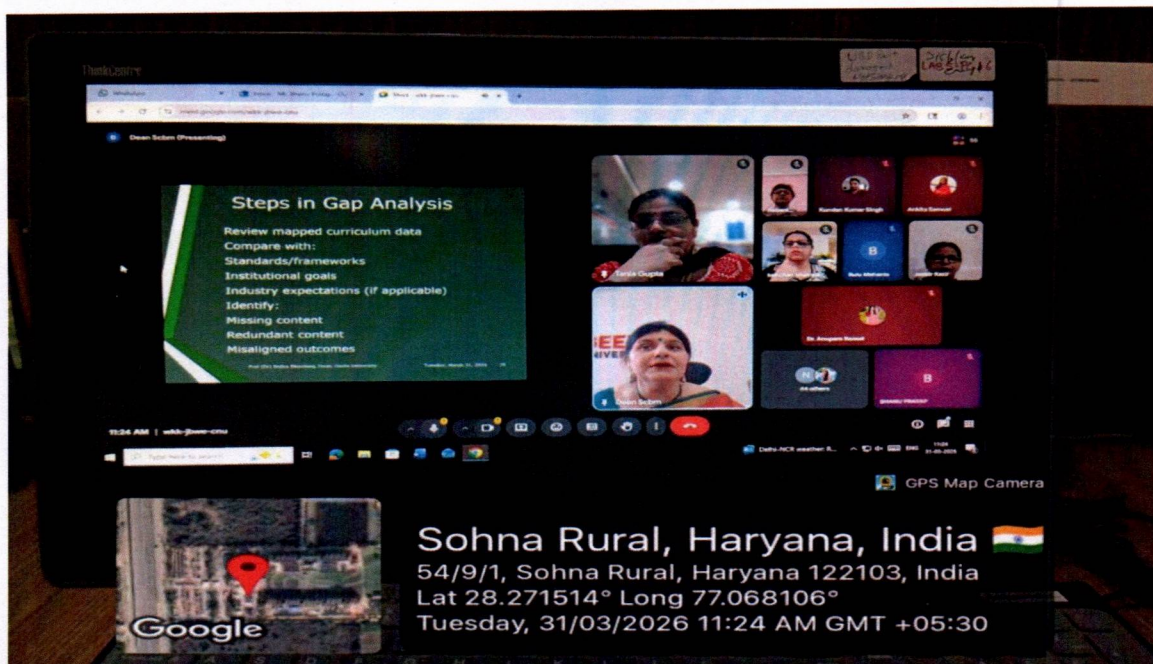

## **Session 2: Experiential, Project-Based, and Interdisciplinary Learning Models**

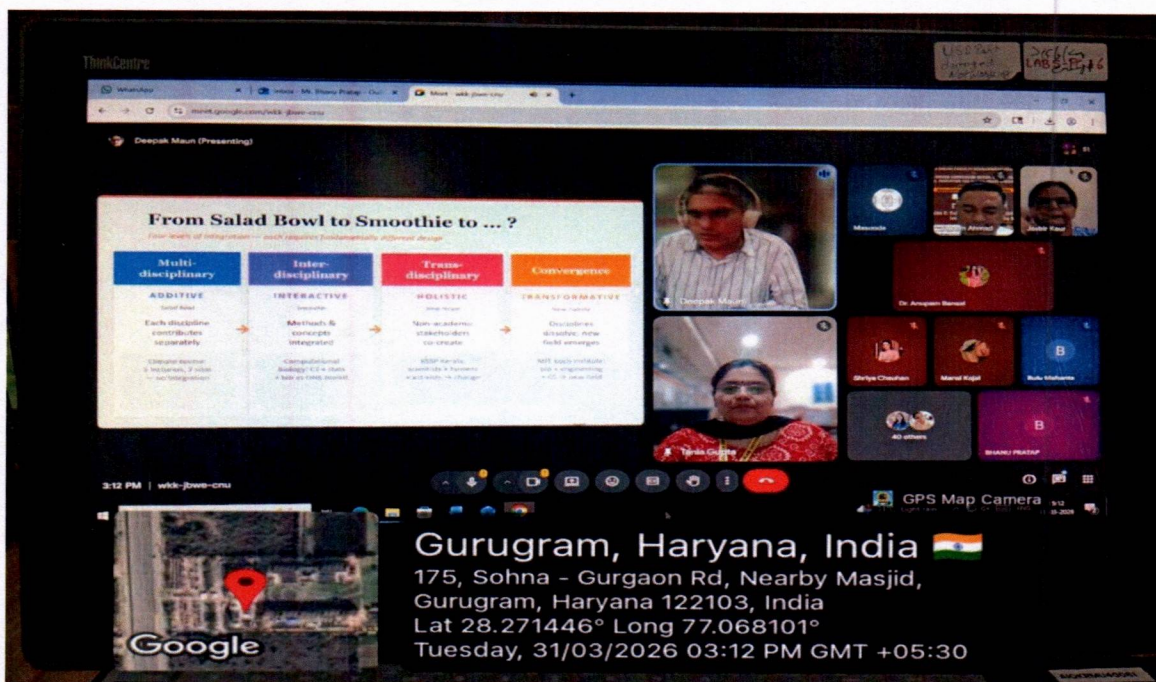

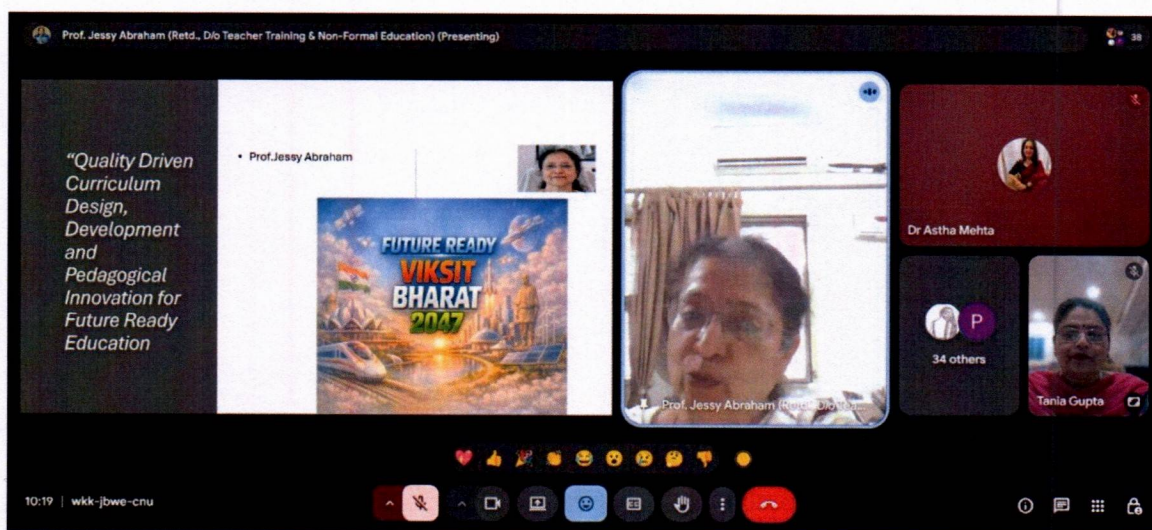

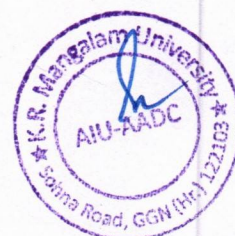
**Session 1: Innovative and Active Learning Strategies**

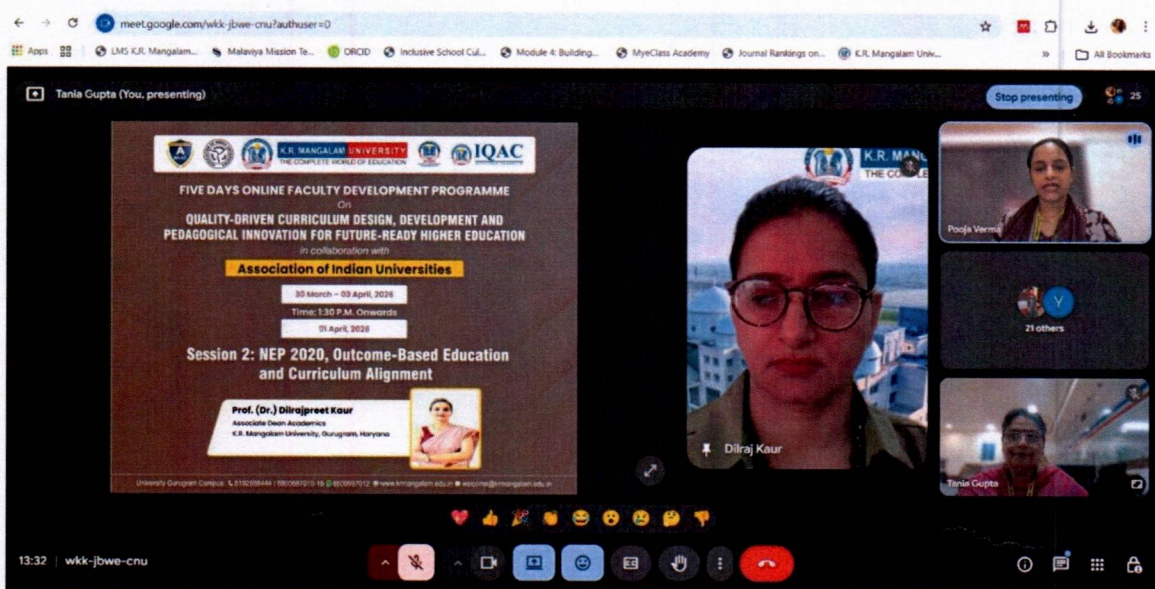

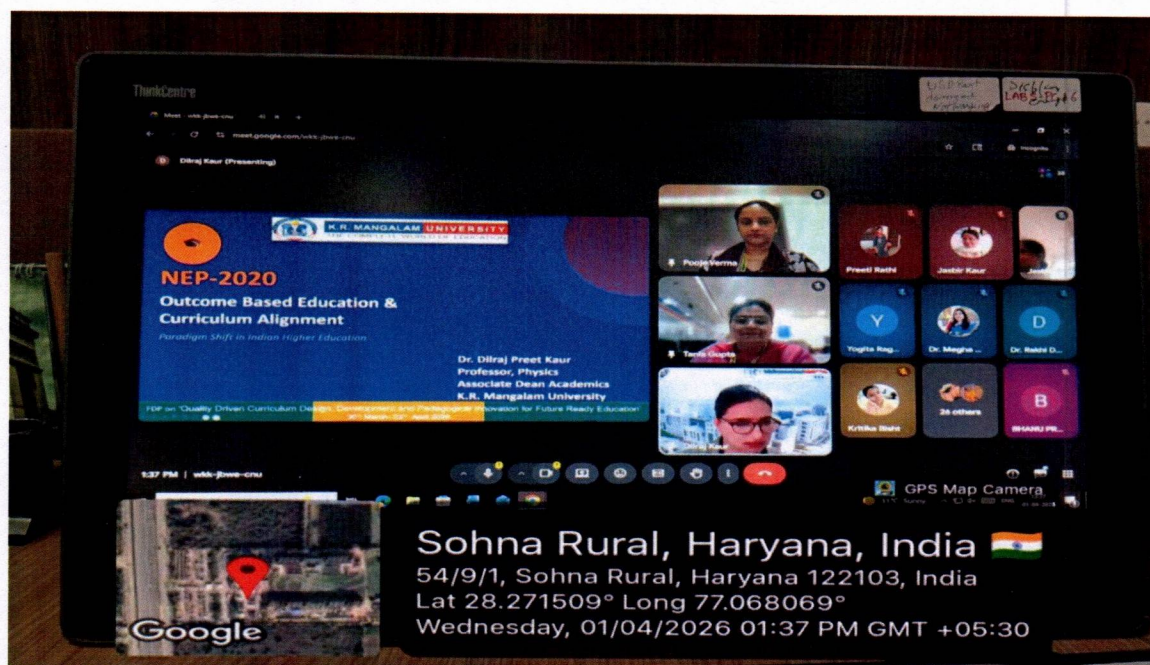
## Session 2: NEP 2020, Outcome-Based Education, and Curriculum Alignment

### **Session 2: Documentation for NAAC, Quality Audits, and Institutional Review**

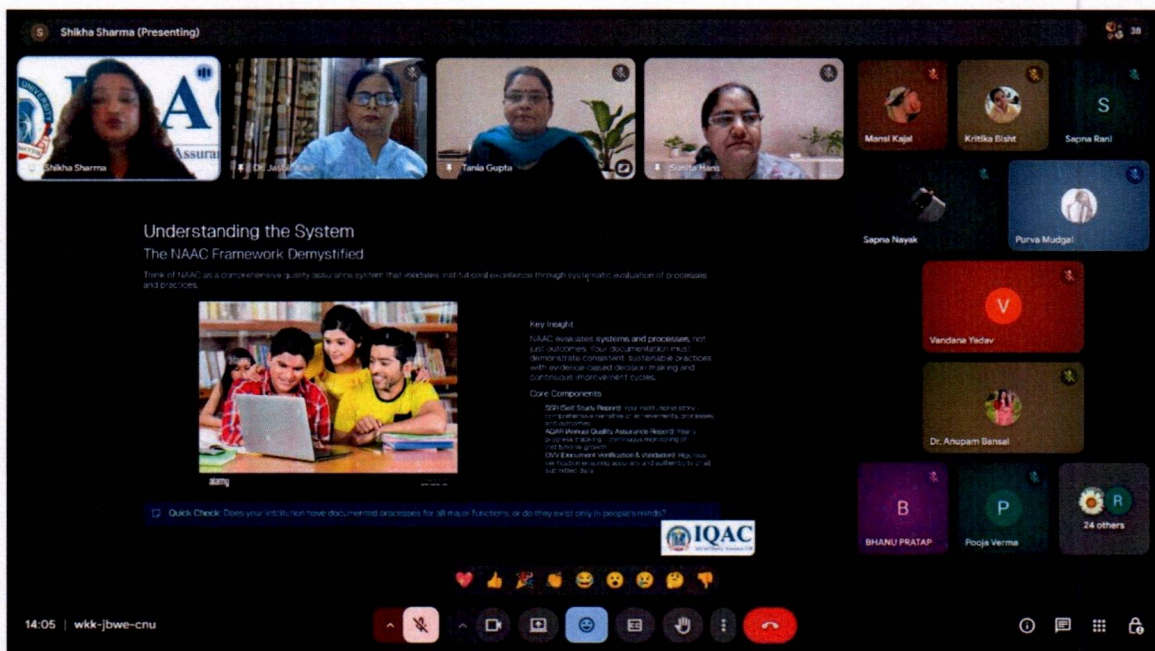






#### 6. Conclusion
