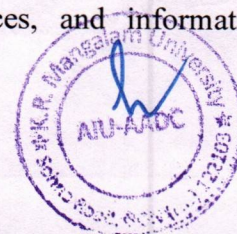

- Align institutional practices with NAAC, NEP 2020, and global quality frameworks

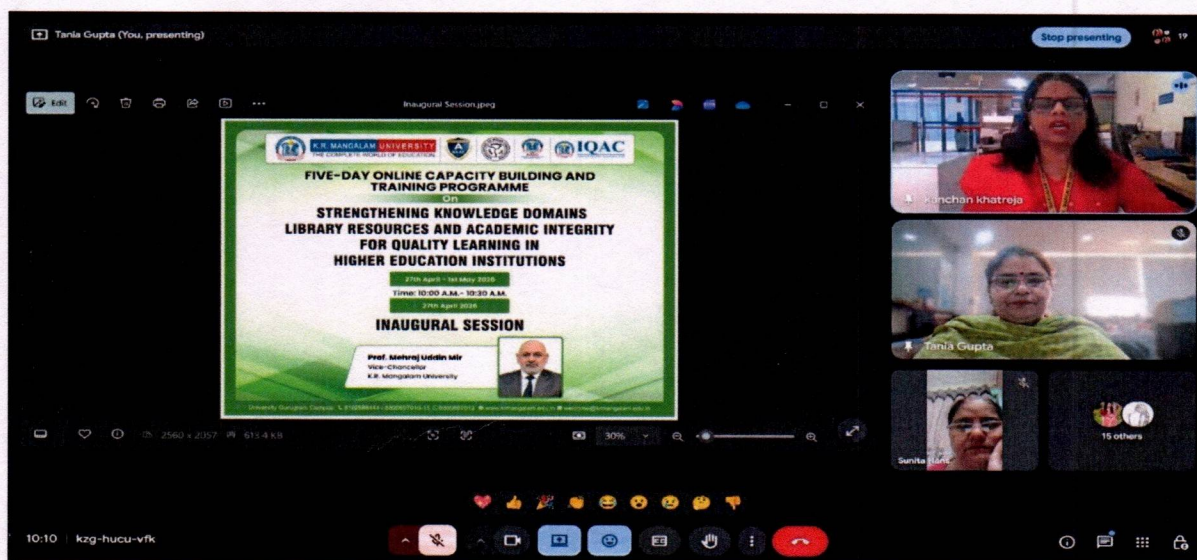

DAY 1 – 27 April 2026

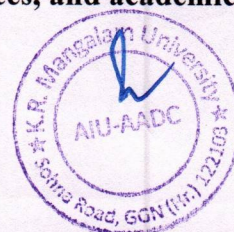
Theme: Foundations of Knowledge Ecosystems

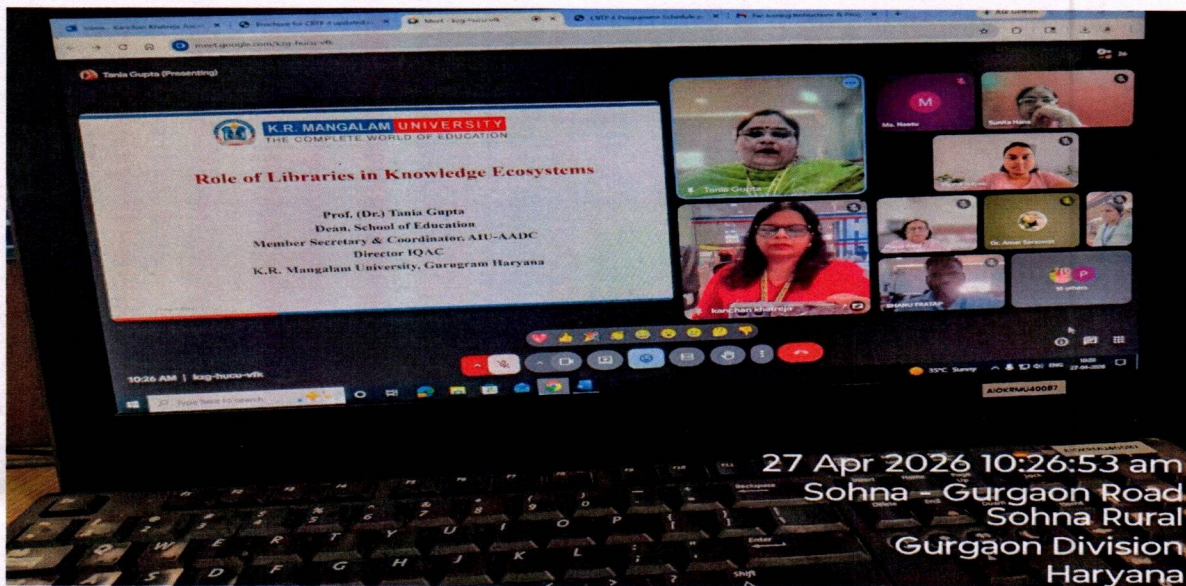

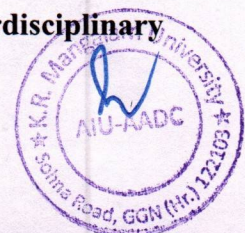

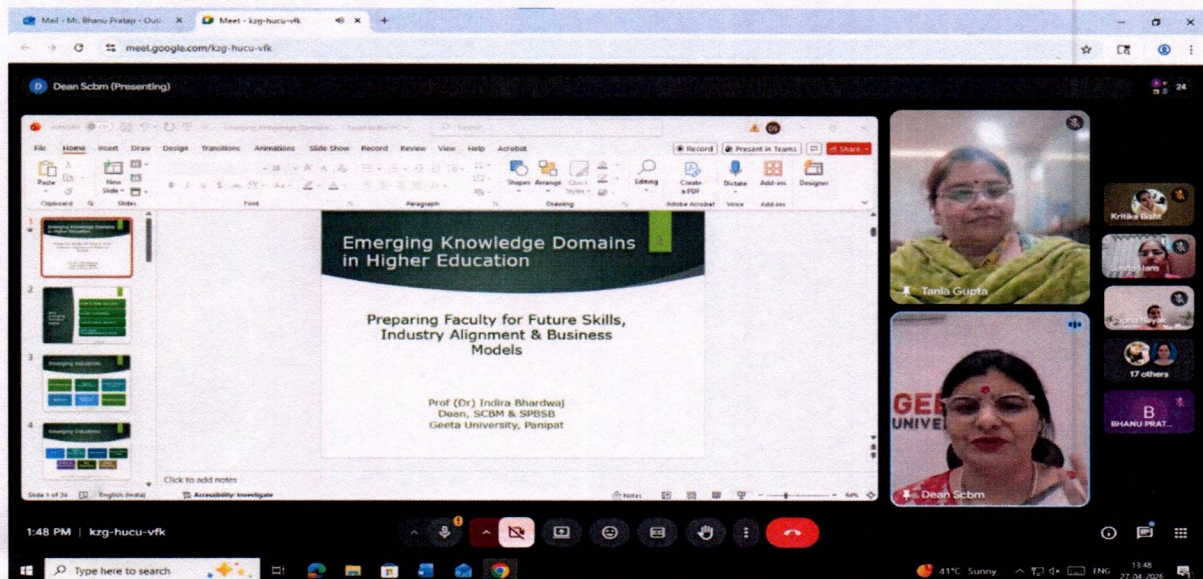

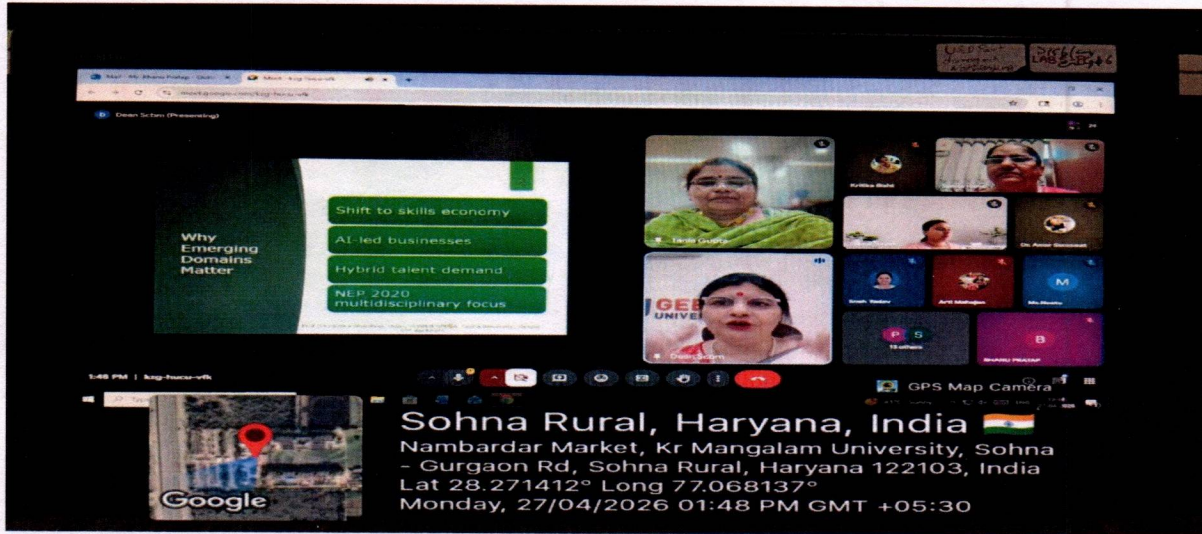

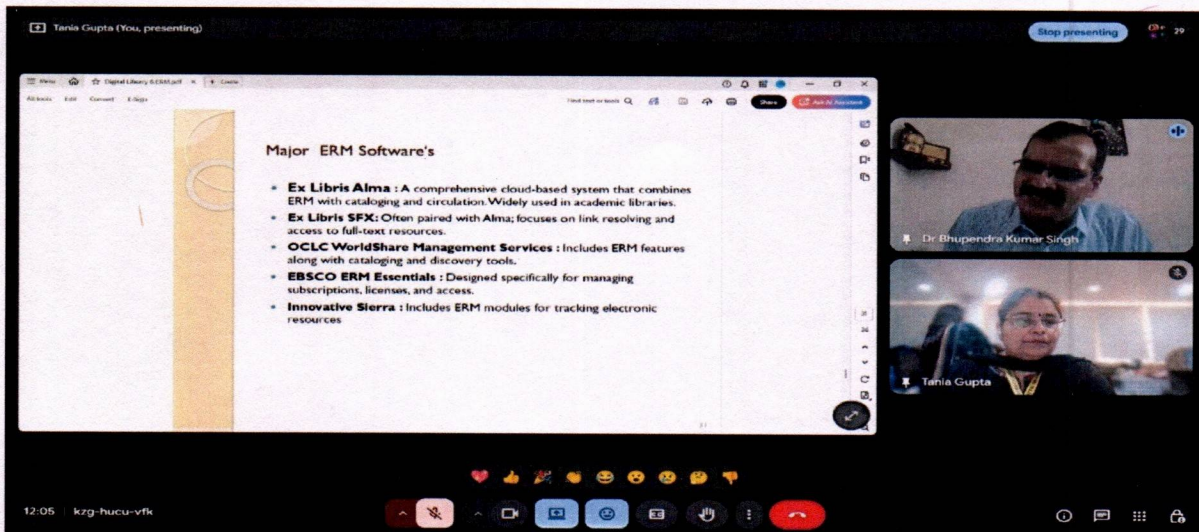
DAY 2 – 28 April 2026

Session 1: Digital Libraries and E-Resources Management

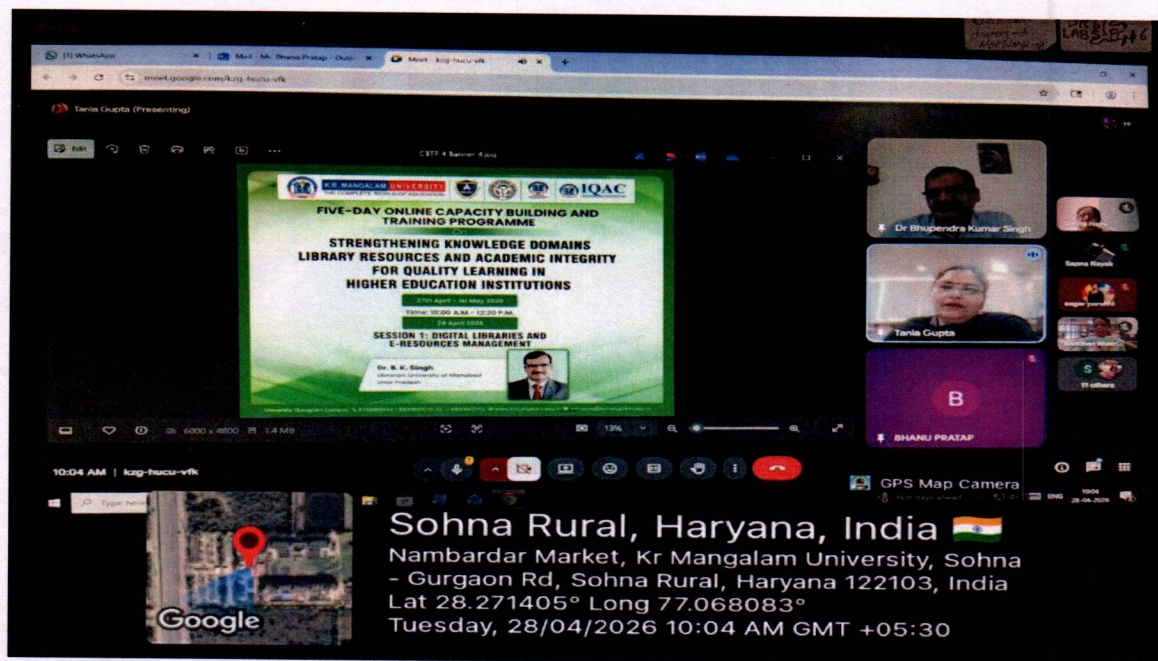

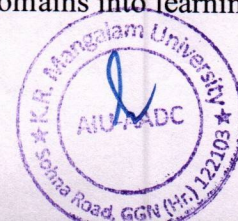
Session 2: Learning Resource Optimization Strategies

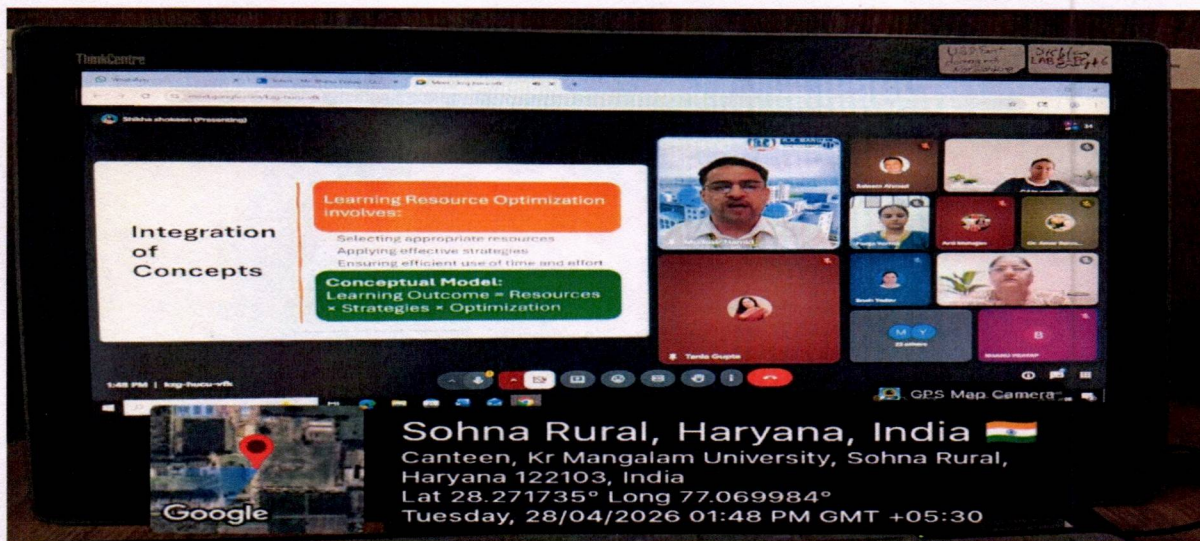

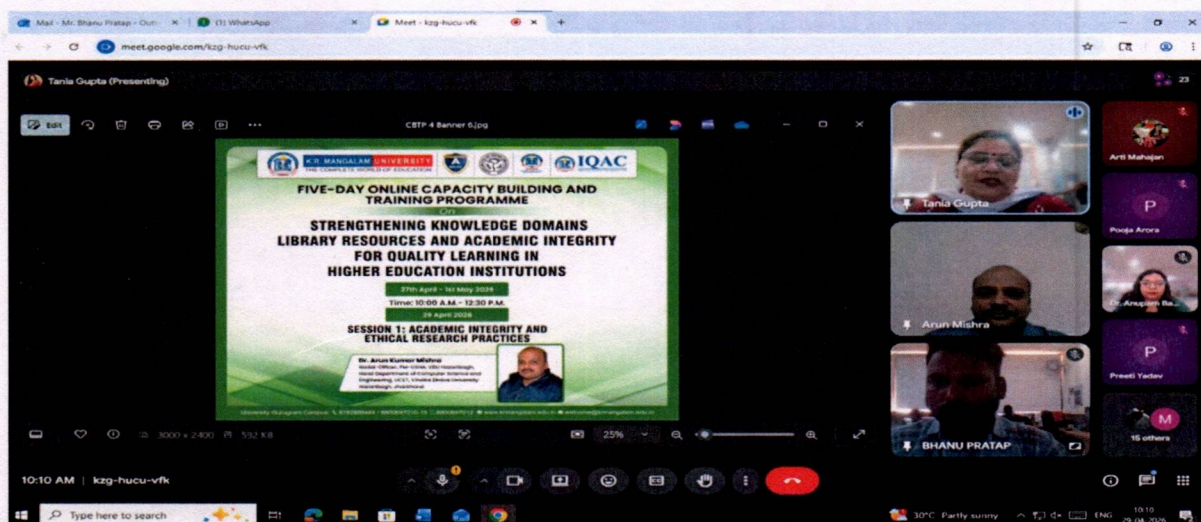

Theme: Academic Integrity and Ethical Practices

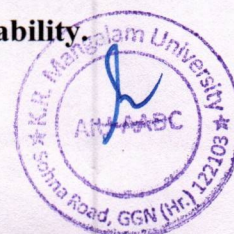

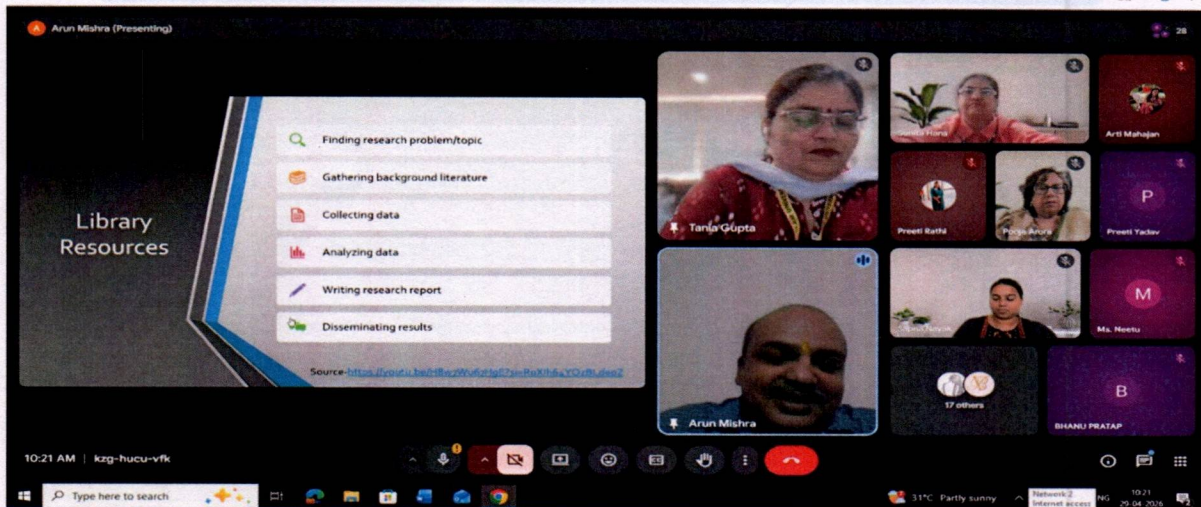

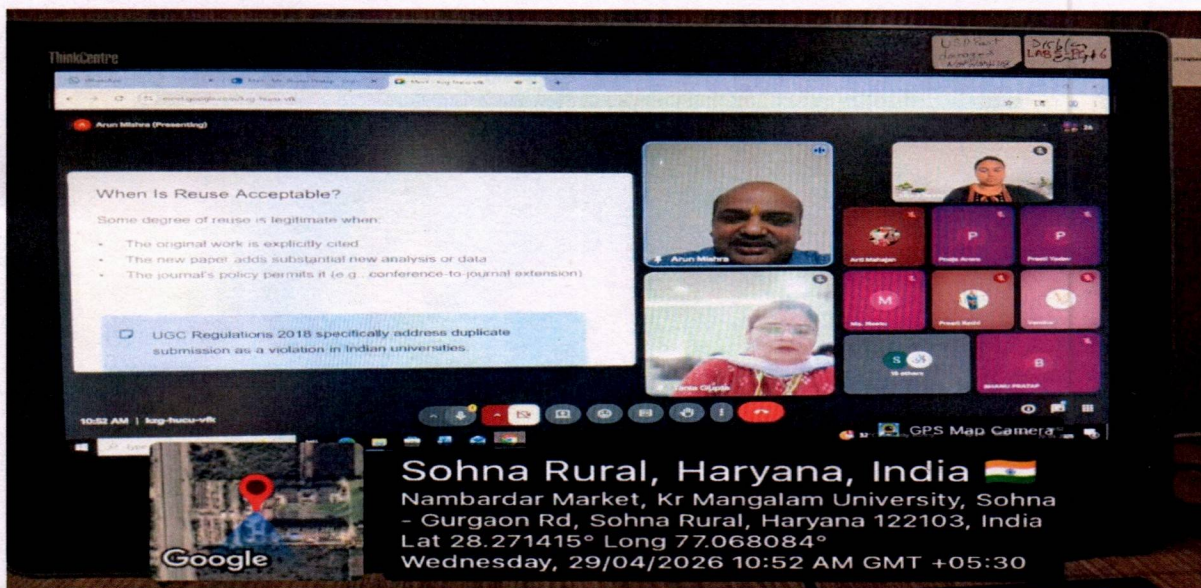

Session 2: Quality Assurance in Library Services

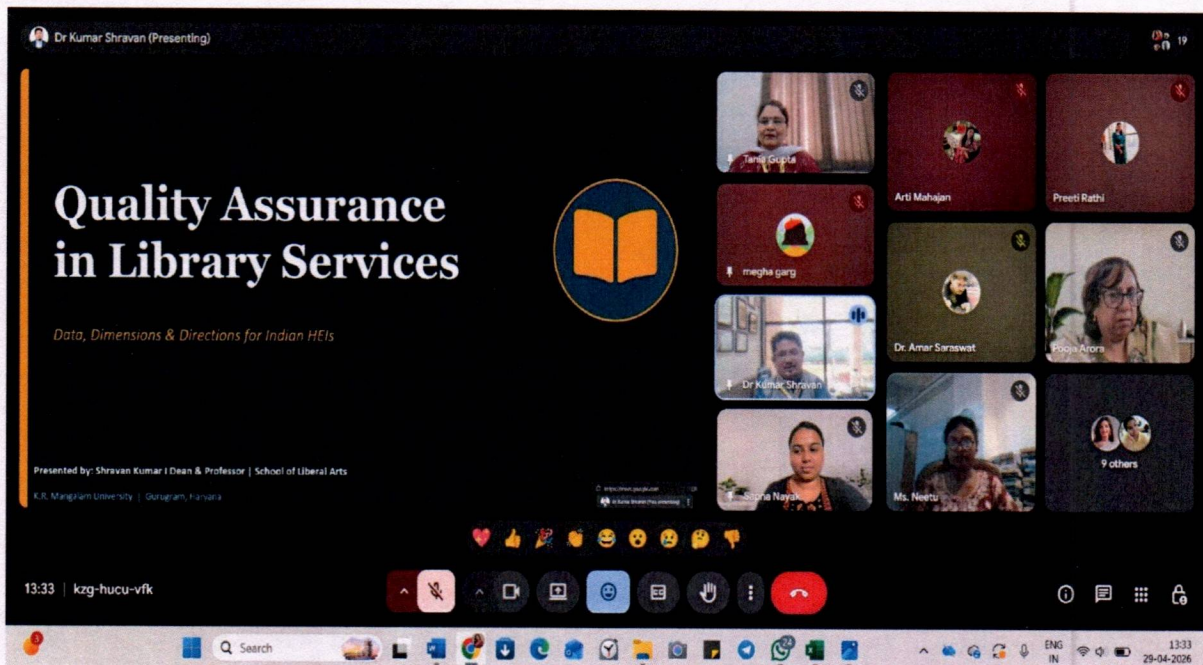

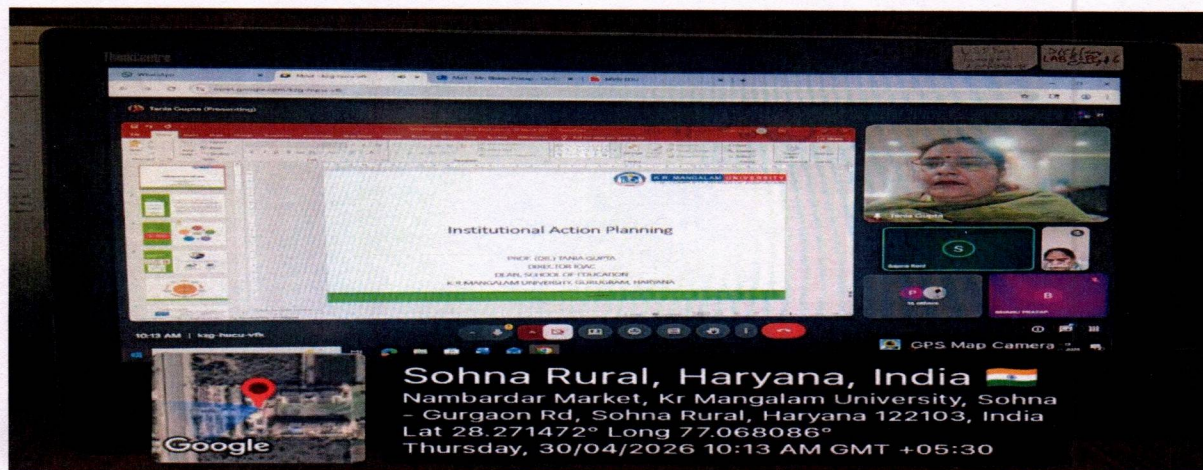
DAY 4 – 30 April 2026

Theme: Quality Assurance and Documentation

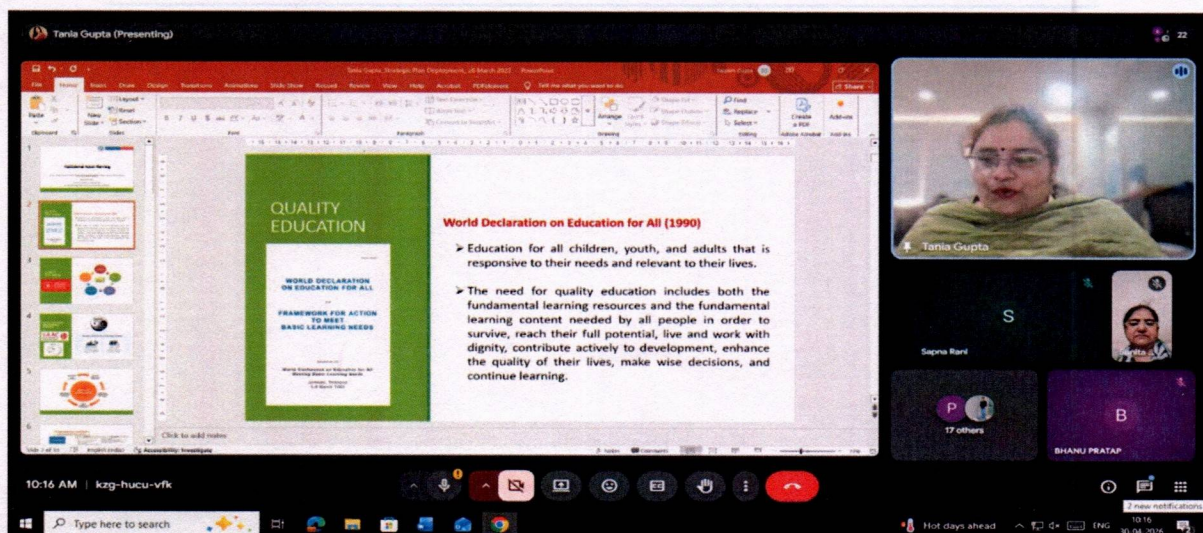
Session 1: Institutional Action Planning

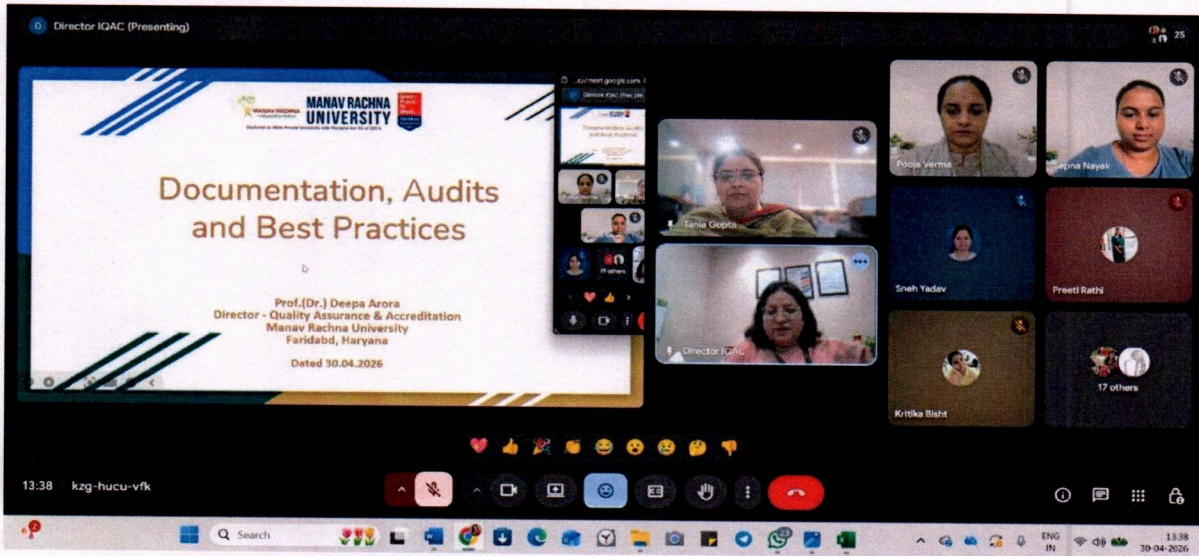

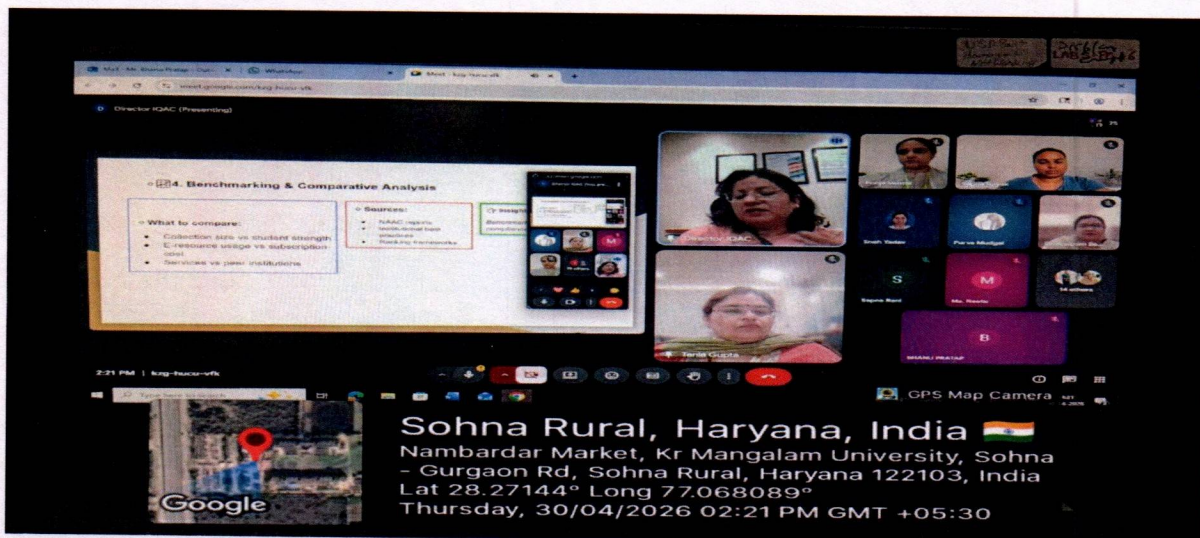
Session 2: Documentation, Audits, and Best Practices

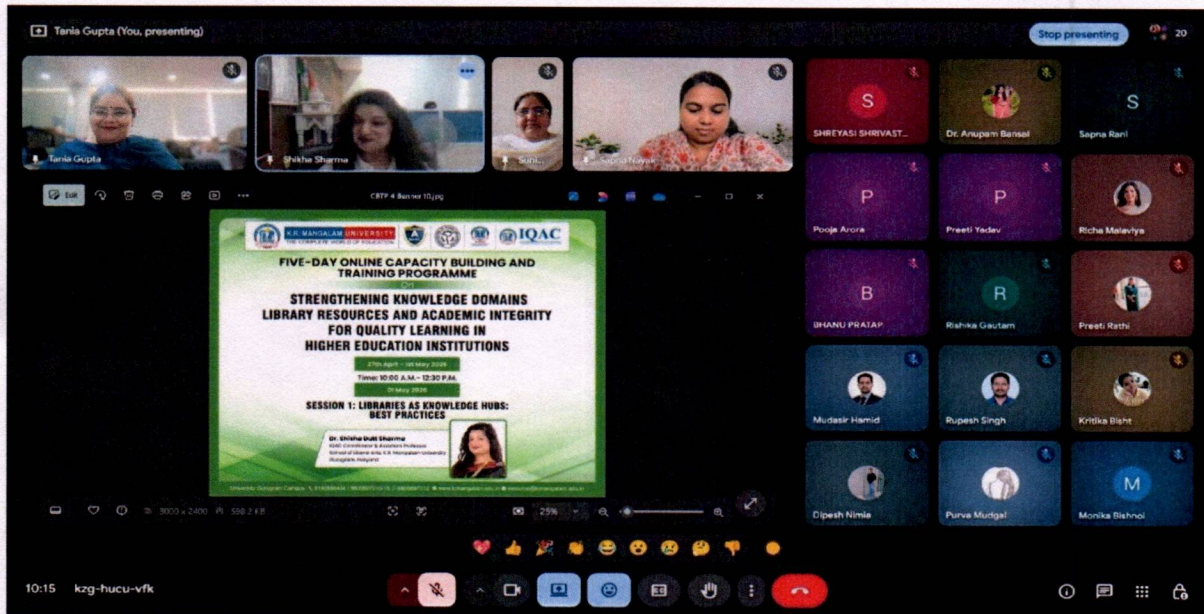
DAY 5 – 01 May 2026

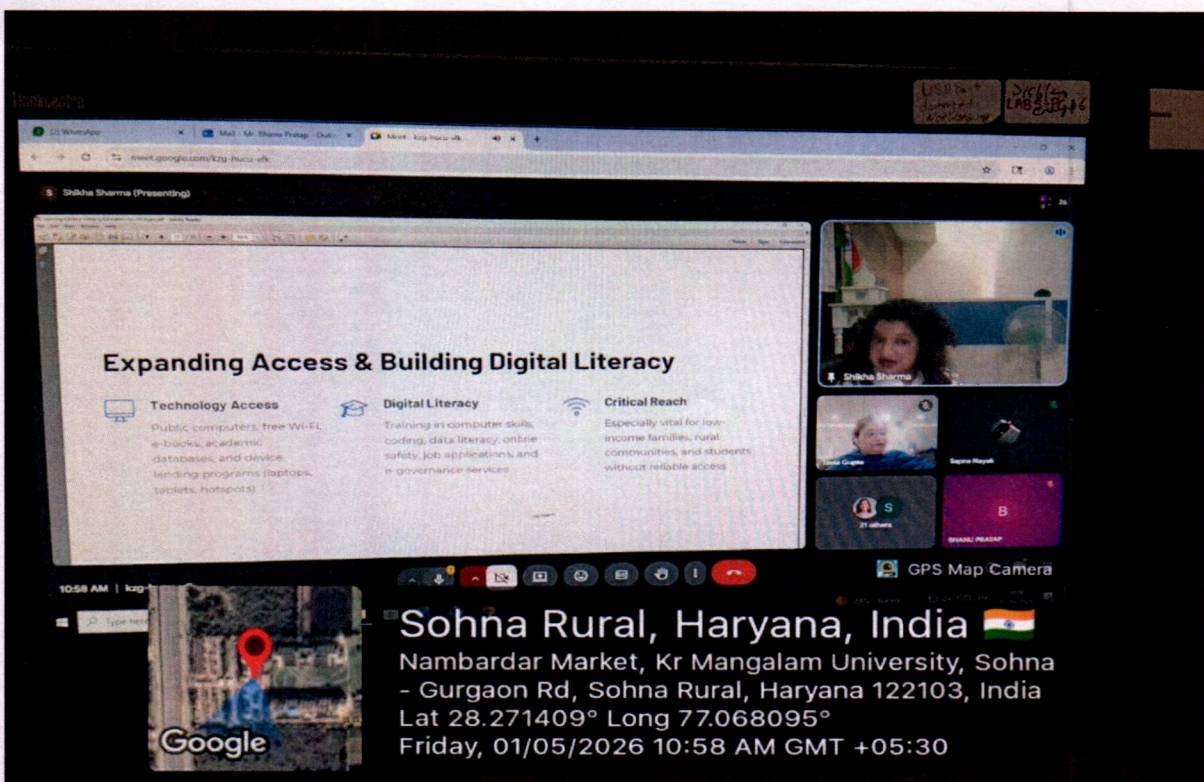

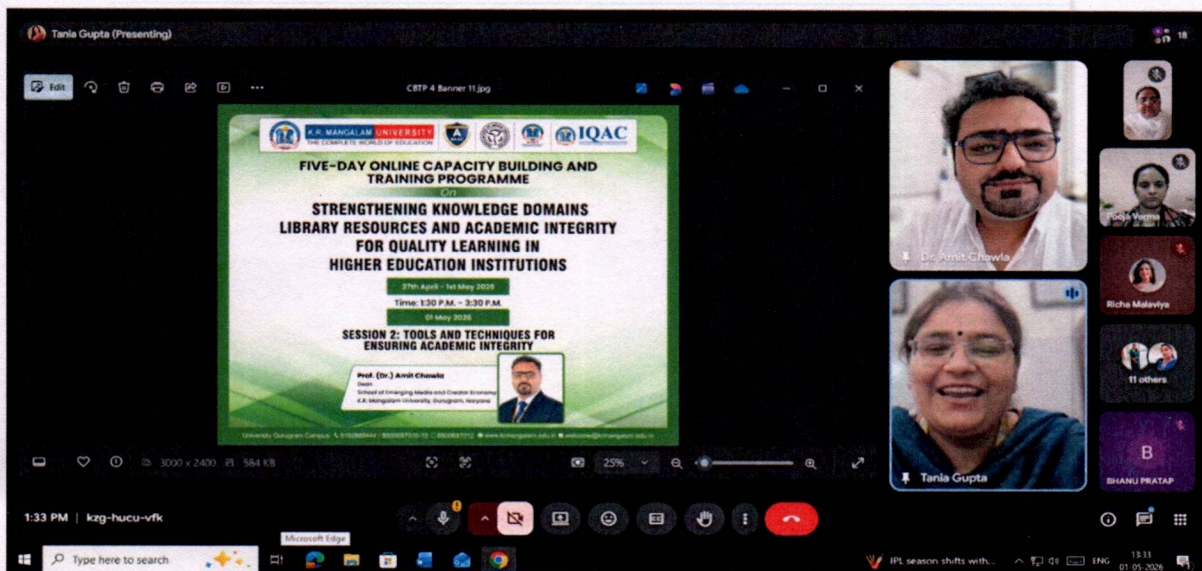

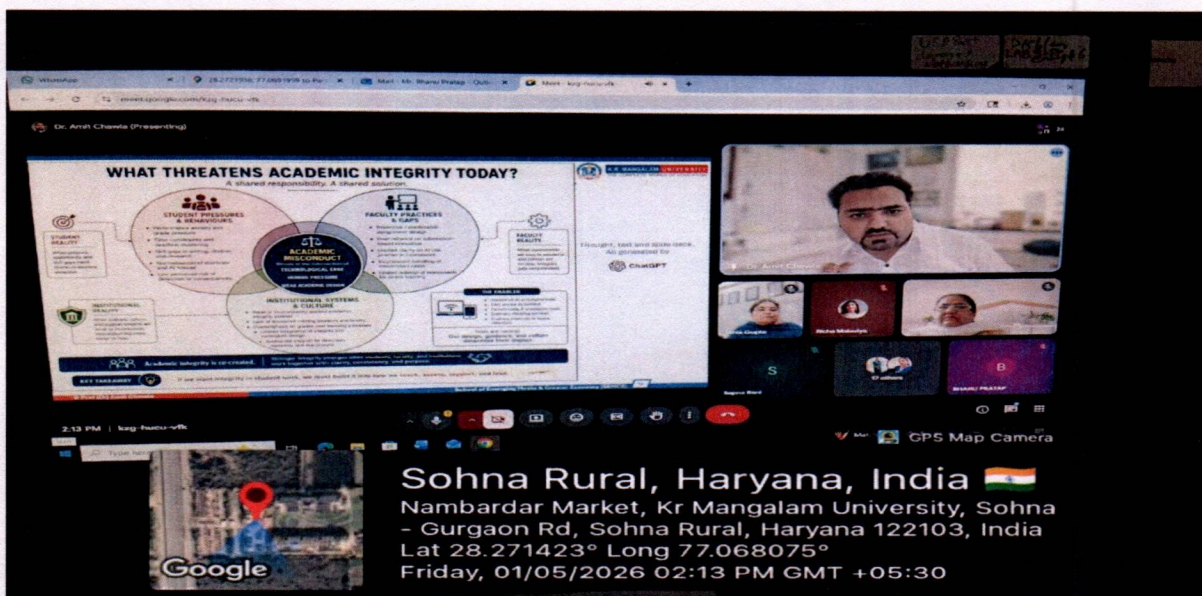
Session 2: Tools and Techniques for Ensuring Academic Integrity
