The recent student exchange program between the School of Architecture and Design at K.R. Mangalam University, Gurgaon, and the School of Architecture and Interior Design at SRM Institute of Science and Technology, Chennai. Continuing their exploration, the students further ventured to Pondicherry and Auroville, where they delved into the concept of sustainability at the Matri Mandir. The visit to Auroville offered insights into the principles of sustainable living and community development, fostering a deeper understanding of environmental consciousness and its integration into architectural practices. Additionally, the students were introduced to the unique blend of French colonial influences and local architectural styles in Pondicherry, enriching their understanding of diverse architectural traditions.

As a crucial component of the exchange program, the students from K.R. Mangalam University had the opportunity to showcase their learning outcomes and experiences during the visit. This culminated in an engaging session where they presented insightful PowerPoint presentations, highlighting their observations and reflections on the architectural and design elements encountered during the program. 






Photo 6: Students and Ar. Disha Shah, at 250 year old Governor house of Pondicherry



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


Photo 7: Students and Faculty members of KRMU at Aurobindo Ashram, Pondicherry

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

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INTRODUCTION






Photo 1: Students and Faculty members of KRMU at IGI Airport.




Photo 2: Students and Faculty members of KRMU at Mahabalipuram




Photo 5: Visit Mahabalipuram (DAY-1)




Photo : Prof. T.R Kamlakannan giving presentation on Mahabalipuram




