The haunting deeds by an Operator

[All names have been made up for confidentiality reasons]

You'd be surprised on how many suicide calls we get.

Sometimes lonely people would call because

they were being bullied, depressed, or in an abusive relationship. Many times we'd get prank calls, or just really disturbing ones. As operators, even if a creep calls we can't just be frank and tell them that no one wants to hear about their... awkward fetishes. I used to work as an operator at a suicide hotline company which I won't name for obvious reasons—but over the years of volunteering, there were many calls that deeply affected me or left me speechlessly confused.

One of my most baffling incident was with a girl named Kelly.

I was still quite new in operating when a girl named Kelly called. Kelly's case was quite different from the ones I was used to handling (such as prank calls, actual suicide calls, creep calls, etc.). She had called asking for advice on her suicidal best friend.

Caller: "H-Hi, my name is Kelly. Could you help me?"

Me: "Of course, we're here to help."

Caller: "I think my friend is suicidal..."

Me: "What makes you think that?"

Caller: "She... she told me once she wasn't happy at home. She sometimes gets picked on at school too. But sometimes... sometimes she mentions suicide. I just want to help her! But I don't know what to do... I don't want her to commit suicide, she's my best friend."

Kelly's voice talked hastily, her nerves showing in her voice.

Me: "Okay, Kelly—I can call you Kelly, right?"

Caller: "Oh, sure."

Me: "Okay, Kelly, let's not jump to conclusions right away. Has your friend been acting strangely?"

Caller: "Um, kind of? She's avoiding me. Avoiding everyone, really. She doesn't respond to calls or texts from me or anyone, it's like she doesn't exist outside the school. She quitted art club, which she love... or used to anyways. I'm worried because she's never done anything like this, completely shutting down."

Me: "Have you tried speaking to her about this?"

Caller: "No... I'm scared that she'd distant herself more, or hate me."

Me: "And why would she hate you for worrying about her?"

Caller: "Yeah, you're right. But how would I bring up the

Me: "Remember, hypothetically your friend might also be afraid of being hated and avoided by you too."

Caller: "So she doesn't get hurt?"

Me: "Yes, you could say it in that way. But this is just hypothetically."

Caller: "OK, I get it. I think I know how to talk to her. Thanks so much for listening. I think I just needed someone to listen to my worries."

Me: "No problem, good luck with your friend."

Caller: *"Wait, can I have your name so maybe I can talk to you again?"

Me: "Oh, we generally aren't allowed to, but ask for the name Robbie the next time you call and I'll try to be with you again."

Caller: "Okay, thanks, Miss! Have a good day."

That was Kelly's first call. I was quite proud of myself for being useful to someone, but my conversation with Kelly was soon forgotten as I carried on taking calls. About a month passed by—until Kelly's next call.

At that time I wasn't taking any calls for I was on a little break. Anne, another one of the volunteer operators rushed over to me saying there was an urgent call—the person refused to talk to anyone but me.

A person named Kelly.

Me: "Kelly? It's me Robbie, is something wrong?"

There was a faint muffled sound that sounded like yelling. Kelly: "M-my friend! She's threatening to jump! I... I don't know what to do!"

I was taken aback for a moment. It took me a second to fully process what was happening. I kept myself from freaking out. I couldn't and wouldn't let Kelly lose her best friend.

Me: "Kelly, Kelly! Please try to calm down—take deep breaths. We've got to have a clear head in order to help your friend, OK?"

Kelly: "Yeah! (breathes in and out) I already called the police already, they're on their way... I'm sorry, I just needed someone. Anybody. They told me to stall her and keep her from jumping... But, I-I..."

Me: "That's perfectly fine. I'm here for you, OK?"

There were a few moments of silence and another more muffled yelling.

Kelly: "I'm sorry, I'm sorry!"

Me: "Kelly? Are you still there?"

There was no reply. The only sound was the loud shuffling of wind—like the sound a video picks up as you are running.

A few weeks passed but the incident was still fresh in my mind. I had managed to accept what happened and although it still hurts thinking about it, that traumatic experience made me work harder. It was after all my first death—it made me push myself harder not to let that happen again. The wounds from that day were beginning to close, and although I had fully accepted never knowing whether or not Kelly's friend turned out to be okay—I found out anyway.

No, I didn't go investigating—Kelly never mentioned where she lived, so that was already out of the question. Instead, I bumped into Kelly at a café.

I had just finished ordering a vanilla latte, when a young girl walked up to me.

She had long wavy light brown hair pulled up into a high ponytail and large dark eyes that made her look like she was in constant shock—freckles peppered her hopeful face. She looked to be around fifteen. I didn't recognize her. Excuse me; is by any chance your name Robbie?"

I nodded, "Yes, I'm Robbie. I'm sorry, but... Do I know





Taboos and myths surrounding menstruation (e.g.- restrictions on meeting her own spouse, entering kitchen or temple, preparing certain foods, touching other people) make it difficult for girls and women to see menstruation as a natural phenomenon and talk about it. The followings are some of the problems which do prevail in our Indian society due to which a need of spreading awareness amongst the society regarding menstruation has risen-

- * 70% mothers consider menstruation 'dirty' and a cultural shame.
- * 8% menstruating women in India use-home made alternatives like old fabrics, rags, sand, ash, wood shavings, old newspapers, dried leaves, hay and plastic.
- * 63 million girls live in their homes without toilet facilities.
- * 20% girls are absent from school due to menstruation which is the second main reason after household work to miss the schools.

The findings show that the knowledge and practice of menstrual hygiene is low. Awareness regarding the need for information about good menstrual practices is very important. So, health education programmes should be setup to create awareness and practice good menstrual hygiene.



Shortcomings of IT Act:

Demerits of IT Act 2000: Though the main objective of IT Act 2000 is to provide legal recognition to electronic methods of communication and storage of information, the law is a classic case of a patchy compilation of vague definitions in important areas like legality of credit card transactions, hacking web sites, online copyrights, cyber etc.

The bone of contention and quite un-popular section of the IT Act had been the Section 66A which punished persons for sending offensive messages and was found to be patently in violation of Act 19(1)(a) of our Constitution as it restricted free speech. It was often used as a tool to gag free speech and this lead to a lot of hue and cry against the act. On 24 March 2015, the Supreme Court of India gave the verdict that Section 66A is unconstitutional in the Shreya Singhal vs. Union of India Case as it invades right to free speech, every _____ expression used in

it is nebulous.

Some of the other existing challenges of the IT Act are: inapplicability, digital signatures (recognize only PKI system), misuse of police powers, no IPR protection guaranteed, ISP not held liable, lack of awareness and non-compliance, overhaul of judicial system and entire mechanism to deliver, speedy trial still a fallacy. So, in short it is safe to state that cyber law is quintessential for the progress of India as a leading developing nation in today's era, but these cyber laws need to be adoptive, evolving and comprehensive to cover all aspects of a highly digitalized world. Therefore, cyber law in its current state is only in infancy and has a long way to go and will need support of much subsequent legislation to cover this ever-expanding, evolving and complex cyberspace.

Vehicles in the near future, will be fuel efficient, zero emission, and use high tech electronics and software to assist drivers in a variety of ways. Vehicles will communicate











